# 9 new international students in 2013 Fall Semester

Orientation for international short-term exchange students and research students, fall semester

#### [Tuesday, October 1, Room A208]

On the first day of the fall semester an orientation was held for all newly arrived international short-term exchange students and research student. At the orientation, Dr Natalie Konomi, Director of the International Center, explained various important procedures and provided information concerning life in Japan, especially in Kitami. The procedures included the first important steps for starting life in Kitami, such as necessary formalities at the City Hall accompanied by a tutor, the establishment of a bank account and the registration at the post office. The orientation included also an introduction of events and activities at KIT, advice on what to do when feeling homesick and other important aspects. The international students were slightly overwhelmed by the detailed garbage separation rules, but they were advised to simply look at the pictures of the pamphlet, if not sure. After this a police officer of the Kitami police station explained what to do in case of facing a crime, traffic regulations especially when riding a bicycle, etc. Japan has the image of being a very safe country, but as you can never know when you might face a crime, we want all our students to be careful.

# German language program in Germany

The university was founded in 1457 and is one of the oldest universities in Germany. In 2007 it was selected by the German government to become one out of 9 "Universities of Excellence". The schedule of the students participating in the language program included language classes in the morning as well as optional seminars and lectures in the afternoon. Extracurricular activities included among others visits to the famous Neuschwanstein Castle in Germany, to Strasbourg in the Alsace region of France, to the Rhine falls and Basel in Switzerland, and to the football stadium enjoying a Bundesliga football game. All students learned a lot during this stay and had a wonderful time in Europe.

# The 7<sup>th</sup> 'TSUDOI no KAI' Cross-cultural Exchange Festival [Saturday, October 5@ Kitami Art & Culture Hall]

The 7<sup>th</sup> Cross-cultural Exchange Festival by 'Tsudoi no Kai', a study group for the training of women in Kitami was held from 14:00 at the Kitami Art & Culture Hall on October 5. Aihebaier Ahemaiti from Xinjiang Uygur Territory, China (Master 2<sup>nd</sup> year) and Dr. Natalie Konomi, Director of the International Center, from Germany gave short speeches introducing their home countries and explaining cultural differences. Mr. Ahemaiti explained for example the marriage system in his country. He said that couples could not visit each other at their respective homes before the wedding. The man would first have to get information about the woman's family situation which he had to report to his father and ask his permission first. If he gets the permission, the man, or groom-to-be, has to go to the woman's, or bride-to-be's, house with presents such as clothes and propose to her. Dr. Natalie Konomi told the audience that it was her 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary since she started to live in Japan. She talked about differences between Japan and Germany and said that Japanese diligence and the historical economic development are similar to the German ones. On the contrary, "Omotenashi", typical Japanese service and hospitality, is a very special culture in Japan. She said that she was surprised to see train crews bowing, hot towels and free water service at restaurants etc. when she arrived in Japan for the first time. The audience was very interested in the various speeches and some asked questions during the break. After the speeches, there were a chrysanthemum doll workshop, a tea ceremony workshop and traditional Japanese games workshop. At the end of the festival everyone danced the Kitami-'Bayashi' together, a traditional Kitami dance.

We learned a little Korean and about traditional Korean tea ceremony. Fairbanks is the second largest city in Alaska with a population of 99,192 people. Alaska is 20 times as large as Hokkaido. Winters are very cold, but summers provide comfortable temperatures.
