
in its joints, so it has been getting attention as an energy saving robot. I found this research fascinating and look forward to continuing it.

IWMST2010 Ended in Success



On September 4-5, the International Workshop on Modern Science and Technology was held at KIT. This biennial event has been hosted alternately by Harbin Engineering University, Wuhan University of Science and Technology, the University of Electro-Communications, and Kitami Institute of Technology. This year KIT hosted it as a part of its 50th anniversary celebration.

The workshop opened with an opening ceremony, followed by the keynote address by Dr. Kiyoshi Aoki, KIT. Over 60 presentations were given in both oral and poster sessions, where researchers shared their latest research results. A delegation from National Chen-Yi University of Technology in Taiwan also participated in the workshop as observers, giving us a good opportunity for deepening our budding partnership.

The attendants at the International "C" Hour in July enjoyed drawing etegami, watercolor postcards, under the guidance of a local etegami instructor Ms. Chiyo Kobayashi. Etegami, which literally means "letter with a picture," has three basic rules: "Do not try to be skillful," "Do it without rehearsal," and "Do not copy after a model." Encouraged by these instructions, each participant freely drew a picture of their choice and added a short message. When the postcards were done, Ms. Kobayashi gave each a stamp, saying that a letter is not a letter until it is mailed. Many international students addressed the postcard to their friends and family at home.
